# James: A Letter from Jesus' Brother Trials — James 1:1-4

## Who is James and why should I listen to him? (v.1)

James is a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ (v.1) James was Jesus' brother, who came to faith after the resurrection when Jesus personally appeared to him — he was an eyewitness of Jesus life, death, resurrection (John 7:5; 1Cor 5:17) James was an apostle (Gal 1:19)

James died for Jesus

## Who did James write this letter to? (v.1)

To the twelve tribes — probably referring to Jewish believers In the Dispersion — probably referring to Jewish believers who fled the persecution in Jerusalem in AD 44 (Acts 11:19) From this letter we see that they were suffering refugees, oppressed by the wealthy (5:4-6)

From this letter we see that they were suffering refugees, oppressed by the wealthy (5:4-6), taken to court (2:6), scorned for their faith in Jesus (2:7).

### What does James say to suffering believers? (v.2)

He calls us to see every trial as a time for intense joy.

## Why do trials call for intense joy? (v.3)

Because trials refine our faith and as a result bring us steadfastness.

### Why is steadfastness so valuable? (v.4)

Because we need steadfastness to get to heaven. Jesus gives us all the steadfastness we need through trials — as we let them refine our faith.


### How should we respond to trials?
