Luke on Jesus' Birth The Baby Born To Mary Luke 1:26-56

What did Mary already know about the coming Messiah?

From prophecies like Isaiah 9:6-7, Mary already would have known that the Messiah would be a baby boy, who is Himself the Mighty God, who would be king in the line of David whose kingdom would never end.

What did the angel tell Mary?

You will conceive and bear a son; you shall call his name Jesus; He will be great and the Son of the Most High; God will give him the throne of his father David; He will reign over the house of Jacob forever; His kingdom will have no end.

Mary's question was not — WILL this happen. He question was — HOW can this happen through ME, since I am a virgin?

The angel told her she would become pregnant by God's power, without sexual relations, and therefore her baby would be both fully man and fully God.

How do Elizabeth and her baby respond to Mary? (vv.39-45)

Her baby is John the Baptist, who was sent to prepare the way for the Messiah who is fully God. That's why he leaps for joy.

Elizabeth says that Mary is the mother of her — Elizabeth's — Lord.

So Luke confirms to us that Mary's baby is the Messiah who is fully God.


How does Mary respond to all this? (vv.46-56)

She praises God for doing great things for a humble, undeserving girl like her.

She praises God for doing great things for the humble who admit their need — and for sending away the proud who don't.

She praises God for fulfilling His promise of mercy to Israel.

SO— Luke wants to urge us not to be proud, but admit our need before God and His Messiah — so we can be forgiven, changed, and satisfied.



HOME GROUP DISCUSSION OF SUNDAY'S TEACHING

How does this passage from Luke help you worship Jesus Christ this Christmas season?

What questions did Sunday's message raise in your mind?
